Government guidance on Systematic Synthetic Phonics

- One scheme approach complete fidelity
- Schemes need to be validated
- Schemes must use a sequence of fully decodable books in line with progression of teaching

How we teach phonics

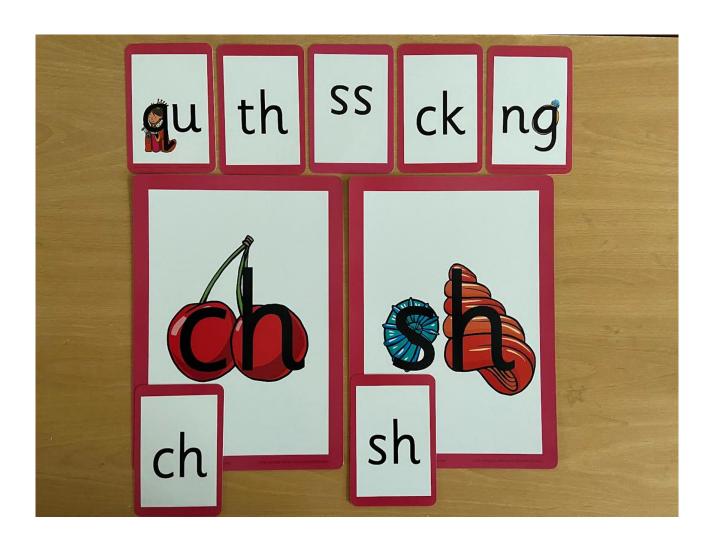
- Daily short sessions

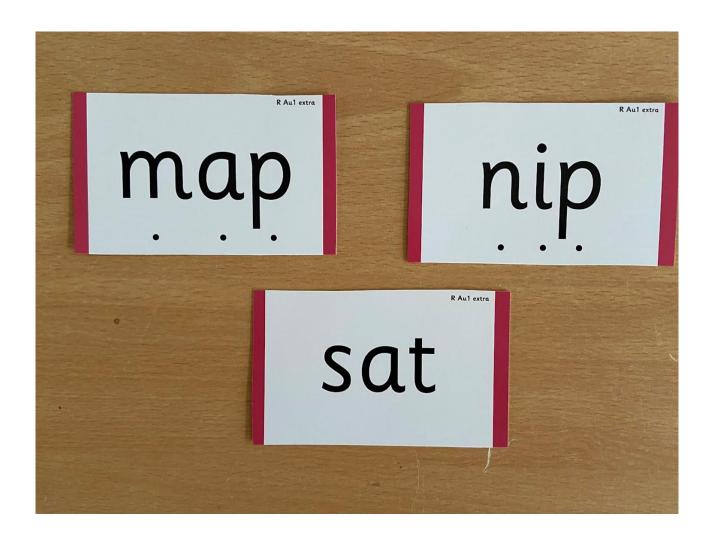

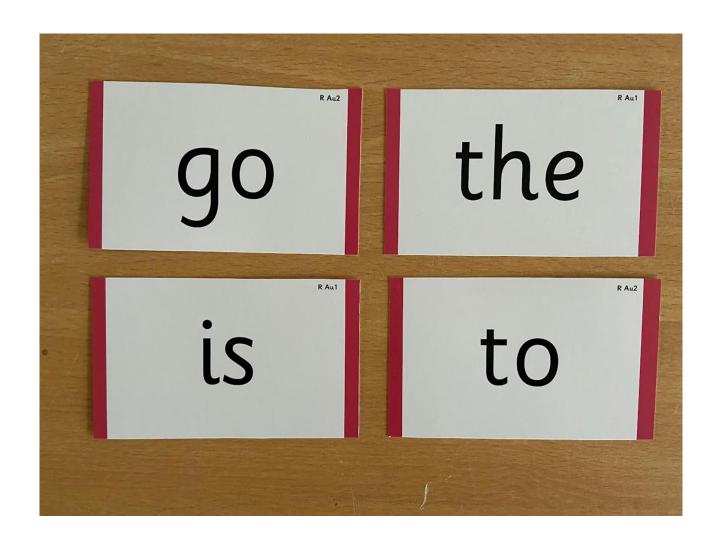




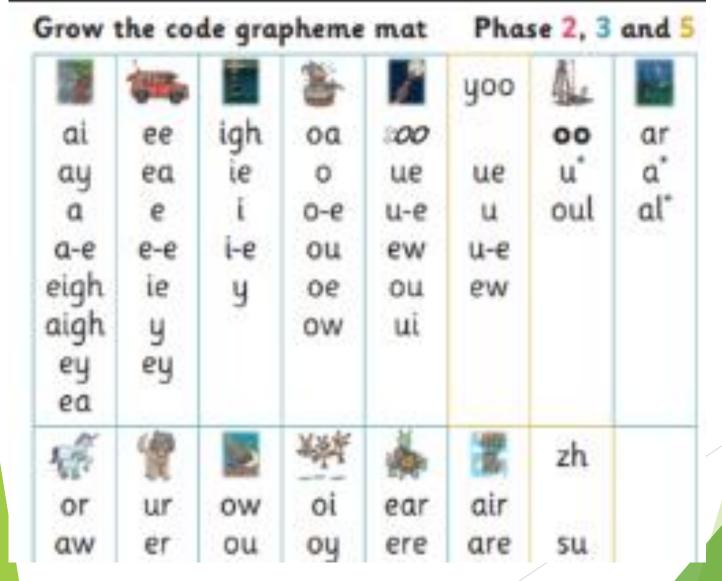

From phonics to spelling

Children on track at the end of Year 1:

Autumn 1	Autumn 2	Spring and Summer
5 weeks: Phase 5 review	5 weeks: Bridge to spelling	20 weeks: Spelling units

Children completing Phase 5:

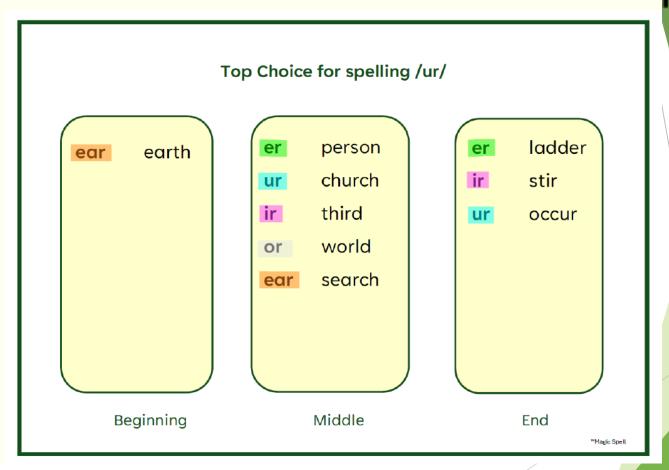
Autumn 1	Autumn 2	Spring 1	Spring 2, Summer 1 & 2	Year 3
Complete Phase 5	5 weeks: Phase 5 review	5 weeks: Bridge to spelling	15 weeks: Spelling units	5 weeks: Spelling units

Teach children with much larger gaps separately (two scenarios outlined below):

Autumn 1	Autumn 2, Spring 1 and 2	Summer 1	Summer 2
Complete Rapid Catch-up Phase 4	16 weeks: Rapid Catch-up Phase 5	5 weeks: Bridge to spelling	5 weeks of spelling (continue in Year 3)

Reading

We want children to love reading.

Reading should be enjoyable.

Learning to read should be a positive experience.



We want children to read for pleasure.

Reading underpins children's access to the curriculum and clearly impacts on their achievement.

LEARN TO READ - READ TO LEARN

Reading Practice

Prior to bringing home a reading practice book with carefully matched words children may have wordless books which develop language skills, teach kingfisher children the layout of books and how to handle books.

Once children have a secure knowledge of a number of GPCs (Grapheme Phoneme Correspondences) and are confidently blending, they will be ready for reading books that use those GPCs.

Reading Practice in school

3 Sessions a week with a trained teacher or TA

To avoid overloading working memory each reading practice focuses on a different reading skill; Kingfisher

- Decoding
- Prosody (reading with meaning and intonation - David Attenborough or storyteller voice)
- Comprehension understand the meaning of the text

To develop fluency the same book is used for each ession and then is taken home to practice again

Reading books are carefully matched to children's secure phonic knowledge and follow the progression.



Decodeable Reading Practice Books

Children should be able to read a book at 90% fluency.

Re-reading a book they have had before helps develop fluency - this is the goal.

Please do not worry that a book is too easy or they have read it before - developing fluency and confidence in reading comes through rereading.

There are questions inside the back cover that could be used as a starting point for discussion.

Please make sure the books come back on Mondays.



Non Decodeable **Sharing Books**

Children will also bring home a 'sharing book'

These are books that are not matched to your child's phonic ability. phonic ability.

To become lifelong readers, it is essential that children read for pleasure

They may not be able to read this book independently, but these books offer a wealth of opportunities for talking about story or information text as well as opportunities for VERBAL comprehension.

Enjoy the book together and foster a love of reading
